Presentation:

Reference answers:

- 2. In China, we don't write with red ink because it is a symbol of death.


Step 3: Apart from customs, language can also show cultural diversity. Suppose some students from our sister school abroad are visiting our school. You are asked to give a talk about "Chinese words and their stories". Brainstorm about words in Chinese and their different usages in different context.

Reference answers:

- 1. "dongxi" can mean "east and west" or "a thing or staff"
- 2. "dayi" can be a noun meaning "general idea" or an adjective meaning "careless"
- 3. "jingshen" can be a noun meaning "spirit" or an adjective meaning "energetic"[[
- 4. "daye" can mean "an arrogant person" or "father's older brother"

Practice:

Play the emotion board game – Ask students to play the game in a group of four. Players need to roll the die and move the game piece that number of squares. Read the emotion written in the square and say a time you have felt this emotion. The first player to get to the end wins!



Reference answers:

In China, I feel cross when I find people leaving their chopsticks standing like poles. / I feel cross when people write my names in red.

In Brazil, I feel astonished when I find people eating with hands.

In Brazil, I feel confused when people say they come from America./In China, I feel confused when people ask me "Ni shi shenme dongxi?"

In United States, I feel disgusted when I find people smoking in public.

In Sweden, I feel embarrassed when people touch my personal space.
