- 2. Moreover, many zoos attempt to <u>replicate</u> an animals' natural habitat: a range of materials is used to <u>create</u> a space that is similar to what would be found in the wild. make or do something again in exactly the same way
- 3. Animals that live in <u>tropical</u> countries are typically housed indoors in warm, heated tanks which re kept at a temperature similar to that of their natural habitat. Extremely hot
